

Profanity in Class is not Classy

According to the Dictionary profanity is: blasphemous or obscene language; a swear word; an oath. A question one might ask is what does blasphemous mean and what is obscene. What might seem like a swear word to some might not seem like swearing to others. It's not uncommon to hear people use swear words in casual conversation. There is a conflict, though, between casual conversation and what is appropriate for a learning environment. This is because some people don't recognize the difference between their home environment, casual conversations with friends, and the School environment. Some students swear whenever they want at any given time.

Because school is a place to learn, swearing can actually distract people in the classroom so that learning doesn't happen. For that reason the use of profanity is considered a Level 1 Behavior Offense at Columbus City Schools.

If you use profanity you may get an after School Detention. And, if the swearing continues, this may result in an Office Referral because the swearing becomes a Level 2 behavior as Insubordination. If the Teacher tells you not to cuss, you're supposed to listen, and if you don't, you're being insubordinate.

Columbus City Schools policy profanity is most clear in the section on "Social Networks/Chat Rooms/e-Mail" in The Guide to Student Success handbook. It states: "Never use profanity, obscenity or other language which may be offensive to another user or intended to harass, intimidate or bully others."

Unfortunately, at the end of the day, for some students, Suspensions and Writeups really don't help because they continue to do the same thing—swearing is a part of how they behave. In essence, these students, like Shannon L. Adler's quote states, have "lost [their] class and control."
